## Understanding Your Water Bill

As an Enterprise Fund, the Village's Water and Sewer Fund is created to account for operations that are financed and operated like private business enterprises. The intent is that costs of providing goods or services to the general public continually be financed or recovered primarily through user charges. All activities necessary to provide such services are accounted for in this fund, including administration, operations, maintenance, billing, and collection. **Village tax dollars are not used to pay any of the costs associated with these water and sewer services.** The Board of Trustees approved and adopted a 10-year Water Rate Study. The study aimed to evaluate the operational and capital costs being charged to the Water and Sewer Fund over the next ten years.

During the execution of the Transmission Main Construction Contract (when the Village moved from receiving water from Chicago to Evanston), the Village froze water rates until the end of Fiscal Year 2022 (April 30, 2022) to allow for the review of the water and sewer rates to prevent a shortfall in the Water and Sewer Fund. Due to the capital costs in the Water and Sewer Fund, such as the water main replacement program and the mandated lead service line replacement, the Village approved and adopted a 10-year Water Rate Study. As a result, the Village implemented water rate increases over the next three years to ensure the Water and Sewer Fund is sustainable in the future.

## Five Components of a Water Bill

### Water Usage

The basic water user charge is calculated quarterly based on consumption. Each unit is 1,000 gallons of metered water consumption. The current base rate is \$6.17 per unit. Before May 1, 2022, this rate was \$8.69 per unit. This represents a 28% decrease in basic water use charges.

### Capital Improvements

Each bill includes a monthly charge of \$3.33 to fund large Capital projects, such as water main replacements. Water bills for residential properties are issued quarterly and reflect a charge of \$9.99 for three months. Water bills for commercial properties are issued monthly. Therefore they reflect the monthly charge of \$3.33. Before May 1, 2022, this rate was \$3.15 per month.

### Water Meter Fund

Residential properties are charged a water meter fee of \$4.76 quarterly. Commercial properties are charged a monthly water meter fund fee of \$9.51. These fees are assessed for the use of the Village's water meters. Before May 1, 2022, the residential rate associated with this fee was \$4.50, and the commercial rate was \$9.00.

### Debt Service Fund

The Debt Service Charge is calculated quarterly at \$3.60 per unit. This charge is allocated to pay debts incurred to improve the water delivery system for projects such as new water main replacements. Before May 1, 2022, this rate was \$0.38 per unit.

### Sewer Use

The Sewer user fee is \$1.06 per unit. Funds generated from the sewer user charge are utilized to maintain the Village's combined sewer system and any improvements or repairs needed. Before May 1, 2022, this rate was \$1.00 per unit. Current rates are effective May 1, 2023, through December 31, 2023. # President's Message

## My fellow residents,

I am extremely proud to report that District 1860 has received a conditional occupancy permit, and its first residents will be moving into the development in mid-May. The "Purple Hyatt" was forced to be closed in 2006 due to violations of the health and safety code, and it never reopened. When I first joined the Board in 2007, we made it a priority to take the steps needed to ensure that the site was redeveloped in a way that would satisfy the desires of the Village. Creating the Tax Increment Financing (TIF) District and instituting the Hotel/Motel Tax were critical in helping to assemble the properties to ensure that a hotel would be part of the redevelopment.

After contending with various landowners who faced multiple bankruptcies and foreclosures, the Great Recession and the fall of traditional brick and mortar retail, it is truly a success to usher in this luxury mixed-use development. This development accomplishes the Village's expressed desire to have a grocer, a hotel, upscale restaurants and a gathering place that we can all enjoy; and it was able to be done with no risk of taxpayer dollars or funding deficit to our schools. We look forward to a formal grand opening to be held in the coming months, but until then we will continue to watch as the site comes to life and begins to flourish.

We are thrilled to announce that we have been awarded a \$2,322,400 Illinois Transportation Enhancement Program (ITEP) Grant for the installation of the Pratt Avenue bicycle lanes. The project will include the complete resurfacing of Pratt Avenue from Cicero to McCormick and all other work associated with the creation of dedicated bicycle lanes in that area. This is another critical step towards the goal of installing a pedestrian bridge over the North Shore Channel at Pratt and McCormick.

We look forward to our annual Memorial Day parade on May 29, followed by the opening of our swimming pool for the season on June 2. If you did not receive the Parks Department Program Guide in the mail, check out our website at [www.lincolnwoodil.org](http://www.lincolnwoodil.org) for all the information you'll need this summer.

Planning for Lincolnwood Fest is underway, and we are excited to be able to continue to improve the offerings and the overall experience for all who attend this great event. New food vendors and musical acts are just the beginning. The carnival venue will be larger to allow for greater comfort and increased attendance. In addition, there will be more seating space for eating and enjoying live entertainment, expanded beverage options, a larger car show and more.

The Illinois Municipal League held its Lobby Day on April 19. I was glad to be able to attend again to advocate on behalf of our Village, and local government collectively, for the issues that matter most to us. In particular we were focused on the Local Government Distributive Fund (the local share of the State's 7% income tax), funding for lead water service line replacement and legislation affecting the ability to utilize incentives such as TIF to support development. Lobbying allows us to communicate our concerns directly to legislators and decision makers as it helps us to shape and fund policies that benefit our community.

The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (MWRD) construction work in Centennial Park along McCormick Blvd is nearing completion and restoration work is scheduled to begin shortly. The next phase of the project will travel West on Devon to Central Avenue in Chicago. For the next several months, this MWRD project will result in traffic pattern changes and partial closures along Devon Avenue. Please be mindful of possible traffic delays during this construction, and when possible, use alternative routes.

The Village has been recognized again as a Tree City USA. Being a Tree City is not just a label, it's a commitment to preserving and enhancing the natural beauty of our community. Trees provide shade, clean air and a sense of tranquility that can greatly enhance our quality of life. By being a Tree City, we are able to access resources and expertise that can help us develop and implement effective strategies for managing our forestry. This allows us to continue to enjoy the many benefits that trees provide, while also ensuring that they are properly cared for and protected for future generations.

I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate Trustees Sargon, Klatzco and Martel on their reelection. I look forward to continuing to work with them and the rest of this Village Board for the next two years as I complete my first term as Mayor.

I was honored to be asked to make a presentation to the 4th grade class of Rutledge Hall on the role of the Mayor and local government in general. I gave brief explanations of the various levels of government and what they do, and then went into depth about what we do on the local level. The 4th graders were engaged and interested as I fielded dozens of questions about Lincolnwood and being Mayor.

The most common questions were focused on the status of District 1860 and the Lincolnwood Town Center. There were quite a few students who were most interested in knowing why I chose to run for Mayor and how my days are spent as Mayor. The answer to the first was quite simple as I Love Lincolnwood! How my days are spent as Mayor is a bit more complicated but I think I was able to give them a good sense of what I do. They had me stumped when they asked me what the hardest part of my job is. I told them I would get back to them.

# Village News

## Attaching Playgrounds and Swings to Public Trees Prohibited

As the summer season begins, the Village wants to remind the public that it is prohibited to attach any rope, wire, nail, or any man-made object to any tree or plant located in the parkway. The parkway is traditionally 33 feet from the center of the road toward a home. This means that swings or suspended playgrounds are prohibited in the parkway and cannot be connected to public trees. When swings, playgrounds, or other objects are found to be connected to a public tree, the neighboring resident will be asked to remove the equipment.



## Vehicle Sticker Renewal

Current vehicle stickers expire on June 30, 2023. As part of this year's renewal, the Village will use a new software program, Third Millennium, to coordinate vehicle stickers. This means there will be a new web portal and address to



### Rat Control Service

The Village's Rat Control Program is a method to reduce the nuisance of rats in neighborhoods. The program seeks to address the source of rats (rat burrows) on public or private property. If rat burrows are not present, the Village will not send its contractor. If the request meets the criteria of this program, this service will be offered at no cost to the resident. The Rat Control Program runs from May 1 through November 30. Please note that this program differs from the existing rodent control program, which treats skunks, raccoons, and possums as part of the Village's cost-sharing program. ## Memorial Day Parade

The annual Memorial Day Parade and Ceremony to honor and remember our American Heroes will be held on Monday, May 29, at 10:20 am. The parade will begin at Pratt and Cicero Avenues, move east down Pratt Avenue to Keeler Avenue, then north to Morse Avenue, and end at Madeleine's Garden in Proesel Park. A ceremony to honor fallen soldiers will take place at the end of the parade route.



## Dog Park Feasibility Study and Community Wide Survey

The Village will be looking at the feasibility of adding a dog park to the Lincolnwood park system as part of the Parks and Recreation Comprehensive Master Plan process. The dog park feasibility study will assist the Village with reviewing preferred site locations and gathering public input on-site locations and preferred design elements. The Village is partnering with consultants from Hitchcock Design Group to host two public input sessions to gather community input on the designs.



The public input sessions will be held on Monday, May 1, and Tuesday, May 30, at 7 pm at the Community Center. A community-wide survey for the dog park will be released in May, and all Lincolnwood residents are encouraged to complete the survey. The survey will be publicized on all Village and Parks and Recreation social media accounts, the Village website, direct solicitation, and announcements at Village Board and Park and Recreation Board meetings. # Public Works

## Water Conservation

From May 15 to September 15, the Village limits the usage of water from the Village water system for the watering of trees, lawns, plants, or any other vegetation and for the washing of sidewalks, driveways, exteriors of buildings, or other outdoor surfaces. The usage of water for the reasons mentioned above is limited to residents who live on the even side of the street on even-numbered days of the month and residents who live on the odd side of the street on odd-numbered days of the month and is restricted for everyone from 12:00 pm to 6:00 pm.

## Capital Projects Summary and Outlook

**Annually, the Village constructs improvements meant to enhance the Village. In Fiscal Year 2022 (May 1, 2022 – April 30, 2023), the Village completed the following projects:**

### Connector Road Resurfacing

The Village completed the Connector Road Resurfacing Project, which included improvements to Lawndale Avenue, Central Park Avenue, and the Northeast Parkway between Touhy Avenue and McCormick Boulevard. The Completion of this project resulted in road resurfacing, pavement patching, new pavement markings, curb repair, sidewalk repair, and an ADA-detectable warning replacement. This project was 80% grant funded.

### Infrastructure Program

In 2018, the Village adopted the Ad-Hoc Infrastructure Committee's plan to resurface all roadways and replace certain water mains over ten years. To date, 39% of roadways have been resurfaced, and 17% of water main replacements have been completed. These improvements will restore the viability of the Village's road network and improve water delivery and service reliability for Lincolnwood residents.

### Roadway Resurfacing Program

Year five of the ten-year roadway resurfacing program will take place in Stub Year 2023, which begins May 1 and ends December 31. The Village will pursue a smaller project size to better align with the change to the Village's fiscal year calendar. The 6700 block of Ramona and Lockwood Avenues will receive a new water main and roadway. Furthermore, 25 lead service lines are planned for replacement. Upon completion of this program, 40% of roadways will have been completed, and 19% of the water main will have been replaced.

### Street Storage Stage III

In 2016, the Village began installing in-pipe restrictors and roadway berms to control water flow into the Village's combined sewer system and minimize the prevalence of sewage backups on private property. This project's third and final stage is set to begin this year in the area generally west of Lincoln Avenue. Completing this project will effectively complete one of the ten projects identified in the Stormwater Master Plan.

### Devon/Lincoln TIF Lighting Installation

Currently, no streetlights are located along Hamlin, Ridgeway, and Arthur Avenues within the Devon/Lincoln TIF area, despite it being a heavy traffic area due to businesses and their customers. The project is currently being designed to construct the improvements this year. The benefit would be making the area more business-friendly by providing lighting for businesses and their customers.

### Pratt Avenue Bicycle Lane Improvements

In 2022, the Village completed the Phase I Engineering Concept Plan to install a protected bike lane on Pratt Avenue between Cicero Avenue and McCormick Boulevard. A public meeting was held on June 16, 2022, to allow public comment on the plan. Following the public meeting and deliberation among the Village Board, it was determined that the west leg (Cicero Avenue to Crawford Avenue) would include a barrier-protected bike lane, and the east portion (Crawford Avenue to McCormick Boulevard) would include a buffered bike lane. The Village expects to begin Phase II Design Engineering this year.

# Fire Department

## The Facts About Using 9-1-1

Smart911 technology continues to be available to residents in Lincolnwood. The technology allows people to register their personal information and pertinent medical information online. When 911 is called, emergency dispatchers can have all the necessary information in case the caller cannot verbally communicate the information directly. With Smart911, residents and business owners can provide 9-1-1 dispatchers and first responders with the critical information you want them to know in any emergency.



When you call 9-1-1, your Smart911 safety profile displays on the 9-1-1 caller screen. Furthermore, Dispatchers can view your information, such as a physical address, medical information, allergies, and home information, description of pets and vehicles, and emergency contacts. You can provide as much or as little information as you like. The Smart911 system can also send emergency alerts regarding weather and other public safety incidents, such as evacuation orders, water boil orders, and severe weather alerts. Smart911 is a nationwide service meaning your Smart911 Safety Profile travels with you and is visible to any participating 9-1-1 center. This service is free to all Lincolnwood residents and businesses; however, message and data rates may apply depending on your provider and phone services. Please refer to your mobile carrier's service plan for more information.

# Police Department

## Bike and Pedestrian Safety

While enjoying the nice weather, the Lincolnwood Police Department would like to share some pedestrian and bicyclist safety tips with the community to help ensure everyone can safely enjoy the warmer weather:

- » **Obey all traffic signs and signals. Be predictable to drivers**
- » **Stay alert - use your ears to listen for traffic. Don't wear headphones.**
- » **Stop, then look left-right-left for traffic (both ways) before entering the street. Bike riders, use your hand signals.**
- » **Walk on the sidewalk and use crosswalks whenever possible.**
- » **Bike riders should travel in the same direction as traffic and ride near the curb. Pass parked vehicles with care.**
- » **Be visible, especially at night. Wear bright or reflective clothing and gear.**



## Home Repair Fraud Prevention

Home repair scams can be costly and create problems for homeowners. Here are some pointers for residents looking for repairs or improvements on their residences.

- » **Check out a company before you decide to have work done.**
- » **Get written estimates and compare bids. Instead of deciding to do business with someone who knocks on your door, get at least three estimates in writing if possible.**
- » **Solicitors must be registered with the Village. If you have questions about a solicitor, call the Non-Emergency number at 847-673-2167 to verify they are registered.**
- » **Beware of unqualified individuals offering to perform work.**
- » **Contractors must be registered with the Village to perform work that requires a permit.**
- » **Beware of contractors that say a permit is not required and call the Village's Community Development Department ahead of time to ask if a permit is required.**
- » **Ask about guarantees and do not pay up-front for the work.**

## April 30 - May 6 is Small Business Week

## District 1860 Construction Update

Construction began in the Fall of 2021 and is progressing steadily. The upper four residential floors of the mixed-use building, which will include ground-floor retail, restaurants, and 299 residential units above, are being constructed in three phases. Phases one and two are close to completion, with leasing operations underway and residential occupancy expected in May. Phase three and the Village Green outdoor space will be completed this summer. The shell of commercial tenant spaces has been completed, and a permit has been issued for the interior build-out of the Fat Rosie's Taco and Tequila Bar tenant space, which will open onto Touhy Avenue. Building permit plans have also been approved for FatPour Tap Works restaurant and bar and Lee Nails, which will both front on the new street, District Avenue. Building plans have been received for a third restaurant, Davanti Enoteca, an Italian wine bar and restaurant which will be located at the corner of Touhy and Lincoln Avenues. Offsite work has been largely completed with the activation of new traffic signals at the intersections of Touhy and Lincoln Avenues, Kilbourn Avenue, and the entrance to the Barclay Condominiums and the District 1860 site. The temporary traffic signal poles have been removed, and sidewalks infilled.
