## **Public Works Announcement:**

### **Leaf Collection and Yard Waste Reminder**

Fall is just around the corner which means leaves are going to start falling. We need your help to keep our sewer systems running smoothly. Please help us keep the catch basins clear by raking fallen leaves off them and keeping leaf piles out of the streets. When the catch basins are obstructed by leaves, it prevents them from properly draining storm water into the sewer system, which can lead to flooded streets and sidewalks. The Village street sweepers cannot sweep piles of leaves as it damages the equipment and homeowners risk a code violation if piles of leaves are reported in the streets. If you have yard leaves or other yard waste material, they can be bagged for Monday yard waste pick up until November 25th.



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## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

What a Fest! This year's Lincolnwood Fest was widely reported to be among the best we've ever had. In our third year under new management, we continue to improve in every way, from the setup to the entertainment to the food, and this year, the weather really worked out great, too. Aside from a little rain at the start of Sunday's car show, it was just about as perfect as you can get for the Fest. Thanks for a great job to all of the dedicated Lincolnwood Staff across all of our departments; it is truly an all-hands-on-deck type of effort to put on this event. In August, we convened a Special meeting of the Village Board to discuss the approved construction of a protected bike lane on Pratt Ave from Cicero to McCormick. The installation of a bike lane on Pratt Ave has been found to be desirable by the majority of the Village and, accordingly, has been included in our Comprehensive Plan. Further, Pratt Ave and the planned pedestrian bridge over the North Shore channel represent a crucial bikeway connecting the Lake Michigan lakefront trail to the Forest Preserve trail to our West at Caldwell and Devon.

In 2019, Village Staff began to pursue grant funding targeted at the installation of a bicycle lane on Pratt Ave. The standards required to secure the grant were lofty and included the need for the bicycle lane to be 'protected' with a physical barrier. After considering multiple options, the Village Board decided on the option most likely to be awarded the grant, which was the option that offered the most protection and required the most work. That application won the award of over \$2 million, including the complete repaving of Pratt Ave from Cicero to McCormick. We moved forward with initial design documents, but prior to moving to construction documents, the Board reviewed what had been approved.

Having observed a similar design in nearby Niles on Howard Street, the Board noted concerns related to emergency vehicle access, trash collection, snow removal, deliveries, and other such activities that would be affected by the installation of a permanent concrete barrier separating the bicycle lane from the roadway. The design was discussed at a Committee of the Whole meeting in June 2024, and that discussion resulted in our calling for a well-publicized Special Meeting in August 2024. At the Special Meeting, there was a lengthy discussion regarding the proposed design. Other than the bicycle lane, factors such as the elimination of parking, increased congestion, varying roadway size, and overall safety factored into the conversation. Ultimately, the Board decided against the previously approved design and directed staff to inquire with IDOT about what changes could be made to the bike lane while maintaining the grant. While we are pausing this project to consider alternatives to the plan, we remain fully committed to the installation of a bicycle lane on Pratt Ave.

Flowers Park reconstruction has been completed and is fully open to the public. Due to some unforeseen circumstances, the project took longer than expected, but the result was certainly worth the wait. Utilizing substantial grant funding and featuring Lincolnwood's first permanent bathroom facility in a neighborhood park, Flowers Park will be the model for Park reconstruction going forward.

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

This summer, we resumed our full schedule of infrastructure improvements, and work is progressing as planned. With 20 blocks currently undergoing substantial water main, sewer, and roadway work, it is certainly hard to miss as you drive throughout town. As a reminder, our infrastructure maintenance and replacement program is defined and scheduled based on needs determined by existing conditions. As we move forward, we will take steps to address the upcoming update to the Comprehensive Plan. This summer, the Village Board authorized the consolidation of the Plan Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals, returning to a single body, which will be again known as the PCZBA. This single body aims to provide uniform and predictable recommendations to the Village Board while allowing for the utilization of Staff and resident volunteer time to address the work needed to update our Comprehensive Plan. A great deal of time and effort will be devoted to reviewing the existing plan and making the changes needed to achieve our goals for the future of the Village.

District 1860 continues to grow as the construction of the hotel phase of the development has gone vertical. As I write this President's Message, the third floor of the 5-story building is being erected, and we continue to track an opening date in early 2026. Davanti Enoteca has rebranded to Mia Francesca, the signature brand for the parent company Scott Harris Hospitality and a Chicagoland favorite for decades. We continue to patiently await the start of construction of the Amazon Fresh grocery store, and the residential occupancy continues to grow at a steady pace as they get closer to being fully rented. We are awaiting the sale of Lincolnwood Town Center and look forward to working with a new owner to redevelop the property into a vibrant and productive asset for the Village.

## FINANCE

The following information highlights the Village of Lincolnwood's Annual Budget Process:

- April to July
  - This process begins with developing the budget calendar that comprises of deadlines, action items, and parties responsible
  - Kick-off meeting with Village Manager and Department Directors is where we start discussion of guidelines and budgetary assumptions which includes our Strategic Budget
  - Towards the end of June, Department Directors are given their budget documents to fill in and submit to the Finance Department in the first week of August
- August to September
  - The Finance Team and Village Manager's Office are reviewing budgetary submissions. Each department director discusses operating expenditures, personnel changes, and capital projects individually.
  - Once the Finance Team compiles the budgetary data together, the Budget Finance Committee Meeting is scheduled for September to discuss further recommendations and changes
- October to December
  - In October, all Departments gather for a Budget Workshop to discuss the current draft with the goal of having a draft ready to present to the Board in November
  - Toward mid-November, the Budget Presentation is developed and ready to present to the Board in the first week of December at the Budget Hearing
  - The Board holds a hearing to review and discuss the details of the proposed budget
- January
  - The Board holds an additional hearing with the goal of approving the Annual Appropriation Ordinance for the new calendar year



### Composting with Groot

Are you looking to reduce your household waste and contribute to a greener community? Groot now offers an excellent composting program for residents! By setting up composting at home, you can easily manage your food waste and yard waste in an eco-friendly manner.

#### How to Get Started:

- **Call Groot:** Residents can opt for the landscape waste subscription program, which includes a 95-gallon cart specifically for yard waste. This cart can also be used to mix approved food scraps with your yard waste, making composting even more convenient. Please do not place food scraps in brown yard waste bags.
- **Prepare Your Food Waste:** Place your food waste in a paper bag. This helps keep your food and yard waste container clean.
- **Timing:** To avoid unpleasant odors and pests, wait to take out your food waste until the day before your scheduled collection day.
- **Keep It Clean:** Ensure your compost is free from inorganic materials such as food labels, staples, rubber bands, plastic packaging, Styrofoam, and plastic wrap.

#### Program Rates:

- **Annual Rental Rate:** From September 1, 2024, through December 31, 2025, the cost is \$60.00 per year.
- **Rate Adjustment:** Starting January 1, 2026, and every January thereafter, the rental rates will increase by 2.5%.

### Centennial Park Cleanup

Are you ready to help keep Lincolnwood green and clean? ## FIRE DEPARTMENT

### A Look Inside the Fire Department's Incident Command Vehicle



The Fire Department is extremely proud of its newest vehicle, identified as Battalion 15. It is a 2023 Ford F150 Responder pick-up equipped with a 3.5 V6 eco-boost twin-turbo engine, 4-wheel drive, rear video camera, anti-locking brakes, belt-minder, tire pressure monitoring system, post-crash alert system, and Ford Telematics, to name a few of the vehicle features. The outfitting included a state-of-the-art warning light package, enhanced audio warning systems, scene lighting, traffic preemption system, and a front-facing dash cam.



The vehicle was completely outfitted to meet the needs and demands of operating as a mobile command post and working platform for the on-duty Incident Commander. The vehicle is designed to respond to a wide variety of incidents including, but not limited to fires, vehicle accidents, mass casualty situations, hazardous material spills, EMS incidents, electrical vehicle fires, fire alarms and weather-related episodes.



The vehicle boasts 3 mobile radios, each capable of communicating on a wide variety of interoperable frequencies allowing full communications between public safety agencies throughout the metropolitan and suburban areas.

Unique to this vehicle is the Extend-O-Bed which pulls out from the rear bed thereby providing a mobile command post platform with tactical tracking boards, two-way radio communications, personnel accountability and tracking, storage and basic medical care supplies including an automated external defibrillator.



The vehicle has a computer laptop allowing connectivity to the 9-1-1 center located in Skokie, internal records management systems, commercial building/occupancy information, live weather, route mapping, global positioning, cellular communications, and fully secured internet access.

The vehicle is extremely versatile and allows effective command and control of any incident it encounters. The Fire Department is pleased with the design and capabilities it offers 24/7.

## “Smoke Alarms: Make Them Work For You!”

The official theme for Fire Prevention Week, October 6–12, 2024

“Smoke alarms: make them work for you!” is the official theme for Fire Prevention Week™, October 6–12, 2024. This year’s focus on working smoke alarms comes in response to data provided by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) showing that many U.S. home fire deaths continue to occur in homes without smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.



Smoke alarms can make a life-saving difference in a home fire, but they need to be installed and working to deliver the needed protection. This year’s Fire Prevention Week campaign reinforces the critical importance of smoke alarms and what’s needed to install, test, and maintain them properly.

According to the NFPA, having working smoke alarms in the home reduces the risk of dying in a home fire by more than half (54 percent). However, roughly three out of five fire deaths occur in homes with either no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms. More than one-third (38 percent) of home fire deaths result from fires in which no smoke alarms are present.

People tend to forget that smoke alarms are required by law, fail to purchase and install them, remove smoke alarm batteries, or dismantle them altogether when they don’t know how to fix the issue. These actions put them at serious risk in the event of a home fire. This year’s Fire Prevention Week campaign gives people the tools and know-how to keep their smoke alarms in working order.

Key messages for this year’s Fire Prevention Week theme, “Smoke alarms: Make them work for you!” include the following:

- Install smoke alarms within 15’ of every room used for sleeping, and on each level (including the basement) of the home.
- Make sure smoke alarms meet the needs of all family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or don’t respond when tested.



The Illinois Smoke Alarm Law, which became effective January 1, 2023, requires Illinois residents to replace their existing older smoke alarms with the type that has a long-term, 10-year sealed battery. This applies to residents who are still using alarms with removable batteries or alarms that are not hardwired.

Fire Prevention Week is celebrated throughout North America every October and is the oldest U.S. public health observance on record. For more than 100 years, Fire Prevention Week has worked to educate people the risk of home fires and ways to minimize them. Local fire departments, schools, and community organizations play a key role in bringing Fire Prevention Week to life in their communities each year and spreading basic but critical fire safety messages.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT



### **Distracted Driving**

Distracted driving occurs any time you take your eyes off the road, your hands off the wheel, and your mind off your primary task: driving safely.

Texting is the most alarming distraction because it involves manual, visual, and cognitive distractions simultaneously. In 2022, 3,308 people were killed in distraction-affected crashes. Sending or reading a text can take your eyes off the road for 4.6 seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of just over an entire football field, blindfolded (USDOT).

### **Here are several recommendations to avoid a potentially serious crash:**

Turn your cell phone off and put it away while driving

Switch your cell phone to silent mode or turn it off before you get into your car. Then, put it away so that it's out of reach during the duration of your travel.

Pullover

If you think the text message is too important to miss, then pull your car over to a safe area before reading/returning a text message.

Don't text at all!

It is a law, and for safety reasons, you should never text and drive, surf the web, or read emails while driving. You cannot concentrate on the road if you have handheld phones or smartphones. It is just too dangerous, not only to your passengers and pedestrians but also to you, the driver.

### **Back to School Safety Reminders**

As summer fades and the school year begins, it's time to ensure that our students are equipped with more than just new backpacks and notebooks. Safety is paramount, whether your children walk, bike, take the bus, or drive to school. Here are some essential back-to-school safety reminders for parents, students, and the community to keep everyone safe and sound.

### **Pedestrian Safety**

- Always use the sidewalk where available. If there's no sidewalk, walk facing traffic.
- Cross streets at designated crosswalks and always look left, right, and left again before crossing.
- Make eye contact with drivers before crossing in front of them.
- Avoid distractions like using phones or headphones when walking.
- Always wear a properly fitted helmet.
- Use bike lanes where available and follow traffic signals and signs.
- Wear bright clothing and use lights and reflectors, especially in low-light conditions.

### **For Drivers:**

- Slow down in school zones and be extra vigilant during pick-up and drop-off times.
- Yield to pedestrians at crosswalks and obey crossing guards.
- Never pass a vehicle stopped for pedestrians.
- Be aware of cyclists, especially when turning or opening car doors.
- Give cyclists at least three feet of space when passing.
- Always stop for school buses with flashing red lights and an extended stop sign. This means children are getting on or off the bus.
- Never pass a bus on the right side where children enter and exit.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT

### School Bus Safety

- Arrive at the bus stop early and stand at least three giant steps away from the curb.
- Wait for the bus to come to a complete stop before approaching.
- Use the handrail when boarding or exiting the bus.
- If you need to cross the street, walk at least ten feet in front of the bus and make sure the driver sees you.

### General Safety Tips

- Update emergency contact information and medical information with the school.
- Teach your children their home address, phone number, and how to contact you in case of an emergency.
- Ensure your child knows the route to and from school and what to do if they feel unsafe.
- Ensure students know their address and phone number.
- Be aware of your surroundings.
- Whenever possible, walk or bike with another person.
- Stay in well-lit areas.
- Limit the use of distracting devices.
- Avoid engaging with or answering questions from strangers.
- If something occurs that makes you feel unsafe, report it immediately to a trusted adult.

By following these safety reminders, we can all contribute to a safer environment for our students as they head back to school. Let's work together to ensure that the start of this school year is a safe and successful one for everyone!

## COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT



### District 1860 Construction Updates

Construction began in the Fall of 2021. The Final Certificate of Occupancy was issued in November 2023 for the mixed-use building and related on- and off-site improvements. Approximately 75 percent of the 299 residential units within the mixed-use building are leased. Fat Rosie's Taco and Tequila Bar, Mia Francesca, LensCrafters, and now FatPour Tap Works are open for business. Lee Nails has an open building permit to build out its storefront within the development.

Mia Francesca's, celebrating its 30th anniversary, is the latest Scott Harris Hospitality restaurant to open at District 1860. Mia Francesca features the zesty, earthy cuisine of Rome and the surrounding areas of Tuscany, Umbria, and Lazio. It was one of the first restaurants in Chicago to encourage the lively art of dining with a contemporary, casually sophisticated trattoria ambiance, simple, rustic cooking, friendly service, and fair prices. The Lincolnwood restaurant is its 13th Chicagoland location.

Building permits have been issued for the next phase of the development, a 5-story, 152-room dual-branded Marriott Hotel. The hotel will be located on Lincoln Avenue, just north of the Village Green. The L-shaped building will feature an indoor pool, fitness center, dining area, and outdoor lounge. Construction activities have progressed with the completion of the foundation and pier system, the construction of above-ground steelwork, and now the framing of wood panel walls above the second floor. The local developer, Lakhani Hospitality, plans to open the Residence Inn and SpringHill Suites hotels in 2025-26.

In addition to paying a penalty and double-permit fees, work that has already been constructed may need to be partially or fully removed. 
