Vehicle Stickers & Pet Licenses

All vehicles with a title that uses a Lincolnwood address require a Village of Lincolnwood vehicle sticker. In addition, all dogs over four months old require a pet license with proof of rabies inoculation. Current vehicle stickers and pet licenses expire June 30, 2025. Renewal letters will be mailed in May. Vehicle stickers and pet licenses can be purchased at Village Hall, through the mail, and online.

New residents have 30 days to purchase Village vehicle stickers to avoid late fees. Fees are as follows:

- \$50 Passenger Vehicle
- \$40 Motorcycle
- \$60 and up Various Trucks
- \$10 per month late fee after June 30
- \$8 pet license (\$4 if dog is spayed or neutered)

To improve communication with customers about vehicle stickers, due dates, and further action if they are delinquent, the Village receives vehicle title information provided by the Secretary of State.

Water Related Rebate Programs

The Village offers a number of residential rebate programs to assist with various water related issues.

Sewer Line Repair Rebate Program

Residents may qualify for up to \$2,000 in rebates for sewer line repairs or replacements within the Village right-of-way caused by tree roots from a Village-owned tree. To qualify, you must submit a sewer televising video from a private plumber verifying the cause of the issue with the application.

Private Flood Control Rebate Program (Indoor)

If your property experiences indoor flooding during storms, the Flood Control Rebate Program can help safeguard your home. This program offers a 50/50 cost-sharing rebate, up to a maximum of \$2,000, for installing overhead sewers or backflow check valves. Before applying, residents must schedule a meeting with the Village Engineer to discuss the project.

Private Drainage Rebate Program (Outdoor)

For residents dealing with backyard flooding after heavy rain, this program supports drainage improvements such as French drains, sump pumps, dry wells, re-grading, and more.

- Individual homeowners may receive a 50% rebate, up to \$2,000, for approved projects.
- Collaborative drainage projects involving multiple homeowners are eligible for a rebate of 50% per participant, up to \$2,500 each, with a maximum total reimbursement of \$10,000 per project.

Lead Service Line Replacement Assistance Program

This Program helps property owners replace lead water service lines.

- Partial replacements (from the water meter or b-box to the indoor connection) and full replacements (from the water main to the indoor connection) are eligible.
- The program offers a 50% rebate of the total project cost, up to \$5,000.

Costs associated with interior restoration are not covered, and funds are limited. Applications are processed on a first-come, first-served basis.

Program funds are limited, so residents are encouraged to apply early. Springtime Home Repair Fraud Prevention

This season brings an increase in home repair scams and ruse burglaries. Home repair scams often involve individuals posing as contractors who offer unsolicited services. These scammers may target vulnerable homeowners, provide subpar work, or disappear after receiving payment. Protect yourself.

1. Be cautious of unsolicited offers. If someone knocks on your door offering repair services, be wary. Legitimate contractors usually don't solicit work door-to-door.
2. Verify credentials. Ask for proof of licensing and insurance, and check references. You can also look up reviews online or contact your local Better Business Bureau.
3. Get written estimates. Always request a written contract that includes the scope of work, materials, timeline, and total cost. Avoid paying in full upfront.
4. Say no to high-pressure tactics. Scammers may try to rush you into making a decision. Take your time to research and compare contractors.
5. Beware of "leftover material" offers. Scammers may claim they have materials left over from another job and can give you a discount. This is often a red flag.

Help Protect Your Community

By staying informed and vigilant, you can protect yourself and your neighbors from becoming victims of fraud and theft. If you suspect a scam or have questions about safety, don't hesitate to reach out to the Lincolnwood Police Department. Together, we can keep our community safe this spring.

Smart911

When registered, your Smart911 Safety Profile, which might include your address, medical information, pet and vehicle descriptions, or emergency contacts, provides critical information to the dispatcher during an emergency call when your ability to communicate may be limited. Registrants choose how much information to provide. Smart911 is a national service meaning your Smart911 Safety Profile travels with you and is visible to any participating 9-1-1 center nationwide. This service is provided to Lincolnwood residents and businesses at no cost. Message and data rates may apply depending on your provider and phone services. 
Scott's Law: The "Move Over" Law

Scott's Law was named in honor of Scott Gillen of the Chicago Fire Department, who was struck and killed by a drunk driver while assisting at a crash on a Chicago Expressway. Since January 1, 2019, over 100 First Responders have been struck and killed by passing motorists on our nation's roadways. When approaching a stationary emergency vehicle that is displaying flashing warning lights, Illinois motorists MUST

- Slow Down.
- Drive with Caution; and move Over to another lane. However, if changing lanes become unsafe, at the minimum, motorists MUST reduce their speed.

In addition to the adoption of Scott's Law, and to help combat this rising concern, HAAS Alert, an independent technology company launched an aggressive mission toward eliminating preventable First Responder collisions. The HAAS Alert Safety Cloud™ collision prevention service is operational and protecting many personnel and fleets across the United States and Canada.

The system is designed to send real-time digital alerts to motorists as they approach emergency scenes as well as alerting motorists to approaching emergency vehicles from any direction.



The Lincolnwood Fire Department installed the device in its newest engine. According to recent monthly data, nearly 1,200 drivers traveling within the Village were alerted to the Fire Department's presence on emergency scenes. This new technology, which has no cost to our public, is a valuable tool in preventing and avoiding collisions between the general public and first responders.

Village Clerk Beryl Herman

It is with sadness that the Village of Lincolnwood announces the peaceful passing of Village Clerk Beryl Herman on February 9, 2025 at the age of 87 years old. First elected in 2005, Beryl Herman was Village Clerk of Lincolnwood for 20 years. As Village Clerk, Beryl Herman's primary responsibilities focused on coordinating Village Board meeting minutes, answering residents' questions, and fulfilling her true passion of registering Lincolnwood voters. Prior to becoming Village Clerk, she worked for Lincolnwood School District 74 for a period of 28 years in various positions, including as an English as a Second Language (ESL) Teacher.

Street Sweeping

Another season of street sweeping begins April 1 through December 12. Street sweeping is a two-day process that divides the Village into eight distinct sections. Even-numbered streets get swept on designated even-numbered days, while odd-numbered streets follow suit. Permanent signs are on each block and will notify you when street sweeping is scheduled in your area. Parking on the side of the street where sweeping will occur may result in a parking ticket. You can access the street sweeping schedule and map online at www.lincolnwoodil.org/StreetSweeping. Check the dates, mark your calendars, and keep our streets clear on your designated days.

OSLAD Grant

The Village was recently awarded a \$600,000 matching OSLAD grant through the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR). For the 2025 grant cycle the IDNR funded over 100 local park projects for more than \$55.2 million to assist communities with acquisition and redevelopment. The grant program was established in 1986 and has awarded more than \$600 million .

The OSLAD award for Proesel Park renovations is the second OSLAD award that the Village of Lincolnwood has received since 2022. The Flowers Park renovation was completed in September of 2024.

The Proesel Park OSLAD renovation will include a universally accessible playground, renovated tennis courts, basketball courts, inline skate court, renovated sand volleyball court, and renovated pedestrian paths on the south side of Proesel Park. It is anticipated that construction on the universally accessible playground will begin in Fall 2025, with the rest of the project being completed 2026.

Rat Control Program and Best Practices

Rats thrive in areas where they can find food, water, and shelter. Protect your properties and deter rats from making themselves at home.

1. Eliminate Food Sources

Rats are opportunistic feeders, and accessible food is their main attraction to residential areas.

- Store garbage in tightly sealed containers.
- Avoid leaving pet food or birdseed outside.
- Pick up fallen fruit or nuts from trees and bushes promptly.

2. Remove Water Sources

Rats need water to survive, so eliminating standing water is critical.

- Repair leaky hoses, faucets, and irrigation systems.
- Ensure that birdbaths, plant saucers, or any other water-collecting items are emptied regularly.
- Direct downspouts away from your home's foundation to prevent pooling.

3. Seal Potential Entry Points

Rats can squeeze through openings as small as a dime. Inspect your homes and garages for gaps and holes.

- Seal cracks in the foundation, walls, and around pipes with steel wool or metal mesh.
- Install weather stripping under doors and around windows.
- Cover vent openings with a fine wire mesh.
- Aging seals on garage doors is a frequent entry point for rats.

4. Declutter and Maintain Landscaping

Rats seek shelter in cluttered or overgrown areas. Create a less inviting environment by:

- Storing firewood at least 18 inches off the ground and away from your home.
- Trimming shrubs and trees to avoid creating dense cover near your property.
- Removing piles of debris, leaves, or yard waste promptly.

5. Keep Your Property Clean

A clean yard is a less appealing habitat for rodents.

- Sweep up crumbs, scraps, and other debris from outdoor dining areas.
- Keep barbecue grills clean and covered.
- Regularly check for signs of rat activity, such as droppings or gnaw marks.
- Ensure there are no piles of debris or cluttered storage areas outside or under decks.

If you've taken these preventative measures and rats still persist, the Village's Rat Control Program works to locate and eliminate rat burrows, ensuring that nests are destroyed, and populations are reduced. Animal Control Rebate

The Village offers an Animal Control Program to assist residents with managing issues caused by opossums, skunks, and raccoons on their property. To participate, residents may select any licensed animal control company to address the issue. Once the trapping service is complete, residents are responsible for paying the full cost directly to the service provider. Please note an animal must be trapped to receive reimbursement. After an animal is trapped, submit a Reimbursement Application to the Public Works Department. Your application must include: a detailed work proposal describing the trapping setup, cost, and animals caught and proof of payment (e.g., a canceled check, paid invoice, or receipt). Once processed, the Village will reimburse 50% of the eligible cost, up to \$200 per address per calendar year.

Reducing Landfill Waste

Composting, the practice of turning organic materials like food scraps and yard waste into nutrient-rich soil, reduces the amount of organic materials sent to landfills and helps recycle the waste scraps into something beneficial to the environment. In Illinois 20% of the waste stream going into landfills could be composted and provide a benefit to the environment. Lincolnwood residents have multiple options to begin composting and contribute to a greener community:

1. At-Home Composting:

- Use a covered, waterproof container or a dedicated compost bin to collect food scraps and yard waste.
- Maintain a balance of "greens" (nitrogen-rich items like fruit scraps, coffee grounds, and grass clippings) and "browns" (carbon-based materials like dried leaves, shredded paper, and small branches).
- Avoid adding meat, dairy, treated wood, or synthetic materials to your compost.
- Regularly aerate the compost pile to support decomposition and reduce odors.

2. Yard Waste and Compost Bin Service:

- Residents can sign up with Groot to receive a dedicated yard waste/compost bin to use from March to November. This service ensures proper disposal of organic waste. To order a bin, call Groot at 847-734-6400.

3. Local Composting Services:

- Collective Resource Compost and WasteNot Composting offer convenient door-to-door pickup services for food scraps and other compostable materials. These programs also offer a seasonal gap coverage for when the yard waste collection period ends from November-March.

Yard Waste Pickup Guidelines

Yard Waste pick-up begins on Monday, March 17 and will continue through November 24. Yard waste should be properly contained in yard waste bags or labeled containers.

Accepted landscape items include grass clippings, leaves, twigs, garden debris, weeds, fruits, seeds, stalks, vines, and branches bundled that are no longer than 4 feet. Items not accepted include wood timbers, plastic edging, plant pots or trays, bags from fertilizers or landscape materials, landscape fabric, root sections, sand, gravel, sod, firewood, rocks, wood chips, bark, excess dirt, or animal waste.


For collection, please ensure that each bag or container weighs no more than fifty pounds. This weight limitation helps facilitate the safe and efficient handling of yard waste during pick-up.

Recycling with Groot

Clean, loose, empty, and dry: all your recycling is streamlined and can go into the Groot-provided bins. While paper can be placed in paper bags (if desired), refrain from bagging other recyclables; instead, place them loosely in the cart. Maintain the integrity of plastic bottles and jugs by leaving their caps on and avoiding flattening or crushing. This assists in sorting the materials at the facility. Flatten cardboard boxes and include them inside your cart, remove any non-paper packing material, and rinse items free of food and beverage residue. Keeping the cart lid closed ensures the materials stay dry.

Apply for Building Permits Early and Online!

Residents and businesses are encouraged to submit permits as soon as possible to avoid delays to their projects. The Community Development Department issues permits for remodeling, repairs, and all new construction projects. Permits are valid for a year, so it's a good idea for community members to apply for their permit early so that they can begin their project when the weather permits. Building Permits Guide

As we welcome spring and summer, many of us are planning updates to our homes. To help your projects go smoothly, here's a simple guide but not an exhaustive list of when you'll need a building permit from the Village.

Projects That Need a Permit: If you're planning big changes like building an addition, remodeling your kitchen or bathroom, or finishing your basement, you'll need a permit first. The same goes for outdoor projects like new decks, fences, and pools, or adding structures like sheds and pergolas. Installing or replacing major systems in your home? You'll need a permit for new HVAC equipment, water heaters, and electrical panels. This includes modern upgrades like solar panels and electric vehicle charging stations. For your yard, significant changes like removing large trees (over 8 inches in diameter) or changing your property's grading also need permits.

Projects That Do Not Need a Permit: Some regular home updates don't need permits! Feel free to paint inside or outside, replace light fixtures, or replace a garage door or screen door. Inside your home, you can update flooring (except in wet areas such as around tubs and showers), reface cabinet surfaces or reface countertops, or change ceiling tiles without a permit. Standard appliance replacements are also good to go.

Assist-a-Family Program

The Village launched the Assist-a-Family Program (previously known as the Harice Leavitt Memorial Fund) to support Lincolnwood residents in financial distress who need assistance with their water and utility bills. Funded by public donations, the Assist-a-Family Program subsidizes water and sewer bills for qualifying residents.

To qualify for the Assist-a-Family Program, household income must be reported and no greater than 200% of the Federal Poverty Line (FPL). FPL guidelines are available

Qualifying residents are eligible to receive up to \$100 to supplement their water and sewer bill payment to the Village in any one instance. An instance is defined as the application of money from the program used towards an outstanding water and sewer bill in an amount exceeding \$100. If a qualifying resident receives a subsidy and then moves to the end of the queue, it is considered an instance. No qualifying resident may receive more than \$200 in a calendar year.
