Memorial Day Parade and Ceremony



Join us for the annual Memorial Day Parade and Ceremony on Monday, May 26. Our community will gather to honor those who made the ultimate sacrifice for our nation. The parade will begin at 10:20 am at the intersection of Kilpatrick Avenue and Pratt Avenue, travel east on Pratt Avenue to Keeler Avenue, then north to Morse Avenue, concluding at Proesel Park. A memorial ceremony will take place in Madeleine's Garden at Proesel Park immediately following the parade. HIGHLIGHTS:

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This is the final President's Message of my first term as Mayor of the Village of Lincolnwood. I am honored and grateful for the opportunity I've had to serve this community. I look forward to another four years of working with our Board of Trustees, Village Manager and Staff, and all those who call Lincolnwood home. Together we accomplished a great deal these past four years, and we have made plans so that our Village continues to prosper. It is remarkable that I was sworn into this Office amidst the Covid Pandemic Era. We have undoubtedly come a long way since then.

Of course, any discussion about Lincolnwood in the last four years seems to have started with District 1860. It's amazing that in 2021 the site was completely empty, and it is now home to over 300 people, exciting new restaurants, and we still have the dual-branded Marriott Hotel, grocery store, and additional retail spaces on the way.

District 1860 was made possible by a collective dedication to the redevelopment of the site with the cooperation of many key stakeholders over the last 10+ years. Beyond District 1860, we made great strides and I take this opportunity to reflect on some of the accomplishments that we achieved together:

- Permitted Floor Area Ratio increase
- 'Service First' model installed in Village Hall operations
- Online permitting instituted
- Lead water service-line replacement program started
- Infrastructure Improvement Program resumed with replacement of streets, sewers, and water mains
- Flowers Park reconstructed using \$400,000 OSLAD Grant (added the first bathroom facility for a neighborhood park)
- Long-desired Pratt Ave Pedestrian Bridge planning underway
- Pratt Ave Bicycle Lane planning completed
- Transitioned Village Budget year to coincide with Calendar year
- Reorganized staffing assignments to provide better service and accountability
- Hired new Fire Chief bringing many updates to the Department
- Hired SEM (Special Events Management) to manage Lincolnwood Fest to improve operations and offerings
- Fostered \$1 million Berger Family Donation to our Parks
- Approved Lincolnwood's first cannabis dispensary to grow and diversify the sales tax base
- Began Snow and Ice Management Program for select sidewalks to improve accessibility throughout town
- New Intergovernmental Agreement with School District 74 for expanded use of our Village's facilities to serve all residents
- Adopted the Harice Leavitt Angel Fund to assist local families in need
- Expanded zoning to allow residential uses above commercial in certain zoning districts

In addition to these highlights, we made a number of changes to codes and regulations to meet the changing tastes and needs of our community. The Community Development Department returned to a primarily in-house operation to provide more responsive service. Landscaping and fencing codes have been reviewed and revised, and additional flexibility has been allowed for building materials and technologies.

At the heart of our success is our focus on planning. Just as our planning efforts led to the reality of District 1860, we will use the planning process as we move forward to support the redevelopment of the Lincolnwood Town Center, create a new Recreation Center, and shape the future of the Village.

The installation of the Pratt Ave Bicycle Lane is grant funded and we will look to use the same method to fund the construction of the Pratt Ave Pedestrian Bridge over the North Branch of the Chicago River. Our Parks Master Plan has led us to create Lincolnwood's first Dog Park, which we are currently seeking approval for in the Commonwealth Edison green space adjacent to Goebelt Park. Proesel Park will receive significant improvements with the inclusion of dedicated pickleball courts and a universally-accessible playground. As I reported late last year, we conducted a Village-wide survey, and the most desired Village amenity is a modern Recreation Center. We also conducted a Village-wide Facilities Assessment and determined that our Aquatic Center is near the end of its useful life and replacement should be considered. We have started discussions to address these needs and are ready to get to work to make it happen.

We worked with our supporting agencies such as IDOT (Illinois Department of Transportation) and we will see improvements in the Village such as a new Village-branded Devon Avenue bridge over I-94 and the reconstructed intersection of Touhy and Cicero to allow for better traffic flow from the expressway. We will continue to advocate for improved maintenance and use of safety measures on these major roadways.

Behind the scenes we are always planning to make us safer for the future. As I discussed in the last issue of this newsletter, our critical infrastructure and first responders are our first priority. Our Police Department is investing in technology and training to deal with the various threats to public safety that come our way and our Fire Department is continuously improving to make sure they are always ready and there when we need them.

In the next couple of years, we will update our Comprehensive Plan which will act as a roadmap for the Village into the next decade and beyond. We will focus our work to make changes which support growth and development of our community while maintaining the Lincolnwood "feel" we cherish so much.

Vehicle Stickers & Pet Licenses

All vehicles with a title that uses a Lincolnwood address require a Village of Lincolnwood vehicle sticker. In addition, all dogs over four months old require a pet license with proof of rabies inoculation. Current vehicle stickers and pet licenses expire June 30, 2025. Renewal letters will be mailed in May. Vehicle stickers and pet licenses can be purchased at Village Hall, through the mail, and online.

New residents have 30 days to purchase Village vehicle stickers to avoid late fees. Fees are as follows:

- \$50 Passenger Vehicle
- \$40 Motorcycle
- \$60+ Various Trucks
- \$10 per month late fee after June 30
- \$8 pet license (\$4 if dog is spayed or neutered)

To improve communication with customers about vehicle stickers, due dates, and further action if they are delinquent, the Village receives vehicle title information provided by the Secretary of State.

Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety

With warmer weather approaching, more residents will be walking and biking in Lincolnwood. Safety is a shared responsibility, and by following these guidelines, we can keep our streets safe for everyone.

For Pedestrians:

- Use crosswalks and obey traffic signals.
- Make eye contact with drivers before crossing.
- Walk on sidewalks or, if unavailable, face traffic.
- Stay alert and avoid distractions like phones.
- Wear bright or reflective clothing at night.

For Bicyclists:

- Follow traffic laws, stopping at stop signs and red lights.
- Ride in the same direction as traffic and use bike lanes when available.
- Wear a helmet for safety.
- Use hand signals for turns and stops.
- Equip your bike with lights when riding after dark.

For Drivers:

- Watch for pedestrians and bicyclists, especially at intersections.
- Slow down in residential areas and near schools.
- Give bicyclists at least three feet of space when passing.
- Yield to pedestrians in crosswalks.
- Avoid distractions like texting while driving.



By staying aware and following these tips, we can reduce accidents and make Lincolnwood safer for everyone. Let's work together to protect our community and enjoy the outdoors safely!

Home Fire Safety

Clothes Dryer Safety

The leading cause of home dryer fires is the failure to clean them. Clean the lint, including around the drum, before or after each drying cycle.

Smoke Detectors

Illinois law requires residents to replace their old smoke alarms with one that has a long-term, 10-year sealed lithium battery. This would apply to residents who are using alarms with removable batteries or alarms that are not hardwired. Ensure smoke detectors are properly installed within 15 feet of every bedroom, and on every level of the home, including the basement. Additionally, test your smoke detector once a month by pushing the test button.



Carbon Monoxide Detectors

Illinois law requires carbon monoxide alarms to be installed within 15 feet of rooms used for sleeping. This law applies only to those occupancies that use fossil fuel to cook, heat, or produce hot water, or occupancies that are connected to an enclosed garage. The carbon monoxide detector may be battery operated, plug-in with battery back-up, or wired into the home's AC power with a secondary battery back-up. It must also bear the label of a nationally recognized testing laboratory and must comply with the most recent standards of the Underwriters Laboratories.



Lincolnwood in Bloom

The Lincolnwood in Bloom competition is intended to show off the residential gardens of the community. This year, it's encouraged to show off native plants, highlighting their environmental benefit but participation is open to all homes both professionally and privately managed. Entries undergo evaluation by the Environmental Commission, with winners earning a gift card to a local business. Gas Leaf Blower Restrictions May 15 to September 30



As summer approaches, please remember that gasoline-powered leaf blowers are not permitted for use within the Village from May 15 to September 30 by both residents and landscaping companies. The best opportunity to address a code violation relating to leaf blowers is when the violation is occurring. Complaints can be made over the phone, and we ask that you include the name of the landscaping company and the address at which the violation is occurring so we can address the situation accordingly. During business hours, Monday through Friday, 8:00 am to 4:00 pm, contact the Code Enforcement Officer at 847-745-4811. If you witness a violation on weekends or outside regular business hours, call the Police Department non-emergency line at 847-673-2167.

Alarm Permits

Village Ordinance requires all residential and commercial properties with active security systems to obtain an annual Alarm Permit. The initial Alarm Permit Fee is \$25.00, and the annual renewal cost is also \$25.00. Annual Permits cover July 1 of the year until June 30 of the following year.

Registering your alarm system helps the Police Department know how to contact a resident or commercial business owner in case of an alarm at a residence or business. Failure to renew an alarm permit or pay service charges in a timely manner will result in a late fee of \$30.00. To view the application, visit www.lincolnwoodil.org/Permitsandlicenses.



Infrastructure Improvements


Each year, the Village invests in critical infrastructure improvements to enhance safety, reliability, and overall quality of life for residents. The 2025 Infrastructure Program includes roadway, water, and sewer system upgrades aimed at maintaining and improving public amenities.

Planned Infrastructure Improvements

- Roadway Resurfacing & Repairs – 12,000 feet (2.25 miles) of roadway resurfacing to improve travel conditions and extend the lifespan of Village streets. Locations include:
 - North Shore (west of the UP Path)
 - Keeler (south of Pratt)
 - Avers (south of Pratt)
 - Morse (between East Prairie and Hamlin)
 - Greenleaf (between Crawford and Hamlin)
 - Kilbourn (south of Lunt)
 - Kenneth (South of Jarvis)
 - Keeler (South of Jarvis north of Touhy)
- Water & Sewer Main Upgrades – Replacement of 7,000 feet of water mains and 288 feet of sewer mains to enhance system reliability and reduce maintenance needs.
- Lead Service Line Replacements – 170 lead service lines to be replaced as part of ongoing efforts to modernize the water distribution system.
- Alley Paving – 700 feet of alleyway to be paved in the Devon TIF district.

No Mow 'til Mother's Day



No Mow 'til Mother's Day is a voluntary program encouraging residents to hold off on mowing their lawn until Mother's Day (May 11). Delaying mowing helps provide vital early-season habitat for pollinators like bees and butterflies. Participating residents registered with the Village prior to April 30 and received a flyer to display in their window to avoid code enforcement issues. Native Plants in Landscaping and Gardening

Planting native plants offers a multitude of benefits for both homeowners and the environment. Native plants are well-adapted to the local climate and soil conditions, making them resilient and low-maintenance landscaping choices. One significant advantage is water conservation, as native plants have deep root systems that can not only require less watering but can efficiently absorb rainwater and reduce runoff, helping to mitigate flooding and erosion issues. Native plants require minimal to no fertilizer once established, as they have evolved to thrive in the nutrient levels naturally found in the soil, reducing the need for chemical fertilizers and promoting healthier soil ecosystems. Planting native species supports local biodiversity by providing habitat and food sources for native wildlife, including birds, butterflies, and bees. By choosing native plants for landscaping projects, homeowners can create beautiful and sustainable gardens that not only conserve water and reduce the need for chemical inputs but also contribute to the preservation of our Village's natural heritage for generations to come. Water Conservation

Water is one of our most valuable treasures that we all share in our community. As we face growing demands and environmental challenges, let's join hands to protect this essential resource with some simple, everyday actions that can make a big difference for our future

1. Fix Leaks Promptly

Repair dripping faucets and leaking toilets quickly—they waste thousands of gallons yearly. The Village contacts residents with abnormal usage to help identify leaks.

2. Upgrade to Water-Efficient Fixtures

Install low-flow showerheads, faucets, and toilets with the EPA's WaterSense label.

3. Be Smart About Lawn Care

Water during early morning or evening to reduce evaporation. Consider drought-resistant plants and rain barrels (available from MWRD at www.mwrdd.org/community-action/rain-barrels).

4. Reduce Indoor Water Use

Turn off taps while brushing teeth, take shorter showers, and run full loads in dishwashers and washing machines.

5. Use Water Wisely Outdoors

Use brooms instead of hoses for cleaning surfaces, and water plants at their base.



District 1860 Construction Updates

Over 90 percent of the 299 residential units within the mixed-use building are leased. Fat Rosie's Taco and Tequila Bar, Mia Francesca, LensCrafters, and now FatPour Tap Works are open for business. Amazon Fresh and Venezia Nail Spa have been issued building permits to build out their respective spaces within the development.



Building permits were issued in late 2023 for the next phase of the development, a 5-story, 152-room dual-branded Marriott Hotel. The hotel will be located on Lincoln Avenue, just north of the Village Green. The L-shaped building will feature an indoor pool, fitness center, dining area, and outdoor lounge. Construction activities have progressed with the completion of the foundation and pier system, the construction of above-ground steelwork, framing of wood panel walls for the fifth floor, underground electrical and plumbing, and enclosure of the building. Rough framing, electrical, and structural steel inspections are underway. The local developer, Lakhani Hospitality, plans to open the Marriott hotel in early 2026.

Tall Grass and Weeds

As springtime approaches, one of the most common code enforcement complaints in the Village is about overgrown grass and weeds. The Village Code requires that grass height does not exceed six inches and that all yard clippings are to be placed in either a yard waste bag or a dedicated container.



The Village Code Enforcement Officer will respond to complaints about tall grass by issuing a violation notice advising the property owner to mow the grass within 7 days. If the owner neglects or refuses to cut the grass within the designated time, a citation will be issued to the property owner so the Village can recoup all costs associated with this process, including an invoice for an outside landscaping firm to cut the lawn. Other penalties may be assessed.

Additionally, please help to keep everyone safe by making sure that any shrubs or trees are trimmed so that they do not block sidewalks, carriage walks, or sightlines adjacent to alleys.
