Call to Order

President Bass called the Regular Meeting of the Lincolnwood Board of Trustees to order at 7:31 P.M. Wednesday, April 7, 2021, in the Council Chambers of the Municipal Complex at 6900 N. Lincoln Avenue, Village of Lincolnwood, County of Cook, and State of Illinois.

The Village President read into the record a statement regarding the applicable Illinois Open Meetings Act provisions that permit the Village Board to conduct a virtual meeting during the pandemic, and informed the public how they can view the meeting as well as how to provide comments remotely.

Pledge to the Flag

The Corporate Authorities and all persons in attendance stood and recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call

On roll call the following were:

A quorum was present.

President Bass requested that all roll call votes at this meeting be started with Trustee Halevi and end with Trustee Klatzco, and be called in the order in which the Trustees sit on the dais.

Approval of Minutes

The minutes of March 2, 2021 and March 16, 2021 Village Board meeting were presented at the Village Board meeting for Village Board approval.

Trustee Patel made a motion to approve both sets of minutes, seconded by Trustee Halevi.

Clerk Herman called the roll.

Trustee Klatzco presented the warrants in the amount of \$407,656.41 and moved to approve the warrants, seconded by Trustee Patel.

President's Report

1. Proclamation Regarding Arbor Day

President Bass noted that the Village once again received recognition from the Arbor Day Foundation for maintaining our "Tree City" designation for the 23rd consecutive year. President Bass stated the criteria for earning the title of "Tree City" and how the Village strives to meet the metrics, one of which is recognition and promotion via a proclamation.

The President Bass read into the record the Arbor Day Proclamation.

2. Proclamation Regarding Fair Housing Act

President Bass asked Village Manager, Anne Marie Gaura, about moving the proclamation to next meeting. Ms. Gaura stated that per her conversation earlier with President Bass there are a few revisions that need to be made to the proclamation and recommended that this item has been moved to the April 20th Village Board meeting. Ms. Gaura stated this would allow the Village Board more time to review the proclamation.

3. Appointment to the Park and Recreation Board for a Term of One Year

President Bass stated this item will be held with consensus of the Village Board.

4. Deputy Chief Travis Raypole

President Bass stated the Deputy Chief Travis Raypole was sworn in to his new position on Monday, April 5 and that a ceremonial swearing in will be held at an upcoming Village Board meeting in May.

5. Parks and Recreation Bench and Tree Donation

President Bass stated that a bench and a tree had generously been donated in honor of two Lincolnwood residents and explained how others can donate trees and benches.

6. Ramadan Begins April 13

President Bass stated that Ramadan begins on April 13 and wanted to take the opportunity to wish an enriching and spiritual Ramadan to our Muslim community. President Bass wished every blessing for health, safety, growth and potential that you seek.

7. Yom HaShoah-Holocaust Memorial Day

President Bass read the following into the record:

The full name of the day commemorating the victims of the Holocaust is "Yom HaShoah Ve-Hagevurah"—in Hebrew literally translated as the "Day of (remembrance of) the Holocaust and the Heroism." It is marked on the 27th day in the month of Nisan — a week after the end of the Passover holiday and a week before Yom Hazikaron (Memorial Day for Israel's fallen soldiers). It marks the anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto uprising.

The date was selected in a resolution passed by Israel's Parliament, the Knesset, on April 12, 1951. Although the date was established by the Israeli government, it has become a day commemorated by

Jewish communities and individuals worldwide. The day's official name - Holocaust and Heorism Remembrance Day - was made formal in a law enacted by the Knesset on August 19, 1953; on March 4, 1959, the Knesset passed another law which determined that tribute to victims of the Holocaust and ghetto uprisings be paid in public observances.

President Bass also spoke of the Assyrian genocide that occurred in the recent past and spoke how the world community has held no one accountable for the Assyrian genocide.

President Bass read the following into the record:

“The Lincolnwood community stands with the Assyrians, the indigenous people of the Middle East, and vehemently opposes all those who commit or support, now and in the past, any and all acts of genocide.

Whereas, Assyrians, as the indigenous people of the Middle East Region, the root of Christianity, and whose Assyrian Empire was the cradle of civilization, have been and continue to be victims of genocide, crimes against humanity, war crimes, and ethnic cleansing in violation of the internationally recognized United Nations Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide signed in Paris France on December 9, 1948 (herein referred to as the U N Genocide Convention).

Whereas, Assyrians have experienced violent persecutions at nearly 50 year intervals over the past two millennia, and over the past century, suffered mass killings, persecution, and forced deportations from their historical lands, especially in the heart of their homeland in the Assyria Nineveh Plain (ANP) of today's Iraq in 1915, 1918, 1922, 1933, 1940-45, 1963-65, 1975, 2010, and as recently as 2014-17, in both ANP as well as the Khabur River Valley in Syria.

Whereas, thousands of Assyrian men women, and children alike were ethnically cleansed in August 1933 in Simele, Iraq. Extensive documentation of this incident, available at the Ashurbanipal Library located in Lincolnwood Illinois, depicts the horrific atrocities committed against the Assyrians including how they were specifically targeted because they were both Assyrian and Christian. For example, Assyrian Priests were tortured, and their bodies' mutilated, Assyrian girls were raped, and Assyrian women were violated and made to march naked before the Iraqi Army commanders, Assyrian Bibles and Holy books were used as fuel for burning Assyrian girls and Assyrian children were run over by military cars. As a result the 7th of August of each year is officially recognized as “Assyrian Martyrs Day”.

Whereas, Assyrians, since the establishment of the Kingdom of Iraq in August 1921 through the present, have silently suffered cultural genocide committed by the Government of Iraq (GOI). As recently as March 2021, the GOI approved and oversaw the demolition of the city walls of the Assyrian capitol of Nineveh, a UNESCO World Heritage site. Only after a Western nation intervened did the GOI halt the demolition several days later. However, the damage s irreparable as the stones from the city walls of the Assyrian capitol of Nineveh have not been accounted for by the GOI, and the case remains unresolved.

Whereas, the lack of any response or accountability for these atrocities most notably the genocide committed against the Assyrians, for being Assyrians and Christian, in Simele, Iraq in August 1933, set a precedent that led to other acts of genocide to occur in the 20th century such as the Holocaust during WW II.

The Lincolnwood community asks all nations to stand in support of the Assyrian people, especially on "Assyrian Martyrs Day", as a continuous reminder that all victims of genocide shall never be forgotten only if those responsible are held accountable."

Trustee Sargon stated she appreciated hearing the proclamation, information and stated that she wished she would have had the opportunity to read ahead of time as an Assyrian American Trustee for the Village of Lincolnwood to review the information and to add information because what was missed is that the State of Illinois is currently assigning a Assyrian Genocide resolution bill to committee as we speak. Trustee Sargon stated that out of respect to an Assyrian American Trustee sitting on the dais she would appreciate if the Mayor ran an item like this before her before speaking to it.

Trustee Sargon stated as part of her work that she does outside of the Village that she advocates for Assyrians in indigenous homeland so again, would have appreciated seeing the language before.

President Bass stated the reading of this information was somewhat spontaneous and brought on by emotion of the Yom HaShoah. President Bass stated he hears Trustee Sargon's words and appreciates it very much.

8. COVID 19 Update

Mayor Bass provided a COVID-19 update. He included that there have been 25,170 residents tested for the virus with 2,094 residents with confirmed cases, 54 residents that have lost their lives to the virus since the virus began.

The Mayor noted the positive direction the COVID-19 numbers are going in the right direction and more vaccinations are being administered.

Residents can look to the Village's website and social media pages for updates on local facility closures, service updates, and how to help neighbors during this unprecedented time. Staff will continue to update these pages as new information becomes available. Our Coronavirus web-page can be found at www.lincolnwoodil.org/our-community/coronavirus/.

He then reminded residents that there are multiple groceries in our area that offer delivery including Walmart Grocery in Lincolnwood. Delivery services can be accessed on their web-pages.

President Bass reminded residents to support Lincolnwood businesses by shopping local.

President Bass reminded people to wear a mask and explained why he was not wearing his in speaking of this issue, was because he was surrounded in plexi-glass and there is air flow.

Mayor Bass also spoke of Lincolnwood condo buildings getting vaccinated along with single family residence.

President Bass also spoke of well-being checks for neighbors.

Regular Business

4. **Consideration of a Recommendation by the Zoning Board of Appeals to Approve an Ordinance Granting Variations for the Development of a Religious Institution at 6424 North Drake Avenue**

This item was presented by Doug Hammel, Development Manager.

Mr. Hammel stated that the petitioner, Mordy Lebovics was present in Council Chambers.

Mr. Hammel provided background on this item and the specific zoning relief that was being requested. Mr. Hammel stated this is actually a repeat request and also involved the vacation of an alley about two and a half years ago related to this development. Mr. Hammel stated that later in the presentation he would pull into the conversation the alley vacation and how it relates to the variations on the current agenda.

Mr. Hammel listed the location of the lot, proximity to residential, size of the lot, length of vacancy as well as the size and number of floors for the proposed building. Mr. Hammel also relayed the variations that were being requested.

Mr. Hammel stated the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) recommended a review of the landscape plan by the landscape architect to be sure that there be adequate screening to prevent headlight glare to the residential section. Mr. Hammel stated the landscape architect already reviewed and noted there were nominal changes that would need to be made.

Mr. Hammel went over the second variation regarding parking lot screening along the west property line. Mr. Hammel stated the code requires an eight foot landscape screen on the west side but there is only 1.5' of space along the west property line.

Mr. Hammel stated the next variation related to parking capacity. Mr. Hammel stated that the parking code requires 50 spaces. Mr. Hammel stated there are only 30 spaces and they do meet the requirement for the worship space. Mr. Hammel stated that the petitioner noted that the worship area and the social hall would not be used at the same time but rather that the worship area would empty into the social hall, that they not be used simultaneously.

Mr. Hammel stated that staff recommended and the Board approved that the social hall and the worship area would not be used simultaneously in a manner that creates parking demand.

Mr. Hammel spoke of the variation regarding the height of the building and the required setback and how the increase in height of the building increases the required setback. Mr. Hammel stated the required front yard setback for this building is 40.5' and the side yard setback would be 20.5'. The variation would be to allow a front yard setback of 27' and a side yard setback of 16'. Mr. Hammel stated the 27' setback is in line with the rest of the block.

Mr. Hammel stated he wanted to provide some context for some decisions that were made that lead to the development site as it is this evening.

Mr. Hammel noted that along the west portion of the property there used to be a 16' alley. Mr. Hammel stated that in late 2017 early 2018 the petitioner approached the Village regarding vacating the alley so they could increase the size of the development lot in an attempt to avoid variations. Mr. Hammel stated the Board was in favor at that time with the condition the development concept be brought back before the Village Board to consider the access and egress from the alley along the west lot line due to concerns from residents regarding access to the site and traffic impact. Mr. Hammel stated in August of 2019 the petitioner met that obligation and came before the Village Board with a revised development. Mr. Hammel stated that development plan increased the size of the building and reduced the number of parking spaces. Mr. Hammel went over some of the other items that occurred with the changes. Mr. Hammel stated the result of the Village Board discussion resulted in changes regarding access and egress. Mr. Hammel stated those items were that the alley only be used by emergency vehicles with signage specifying that in an effort to avoid burdening the residential properties. Mr. Hammel stated the Board also had the condition of a stop sign at egress point to Drake Avenue and that a 12 month follow-up review occur to assess any additional measures that might be needed.

Mr. Hammel stated that at the same time the petitioner was before the Village Board to discuss access and egress the petitioner also had items before the ZBA, and those items that were before the ZBA are not being presented to the Board to consider.

Mr. Hammel spoke of the speed bump near Drake Avenue and the petitioner's request to move that speed bump.

Mr. Hammel went over some of the considerations before the Board. Mr. Hammel stated the petitioner's hope was that if the alley was vacated they would avoid variations but once the plans were developed that was not the case.

Mr. Hammel stated the reason this item was before the Board this evening was in part to have the 2019 items be considered along with the new variations. Mr. Hammel stated that due to delays in the project the previous Ordinance for the 2019 variations expired and the Village Board would need to renew the 2019 variations for the petitioner to obtain the building permit. Mr. Hammel stated the previously approved Ordinance already went through the ZBA and received their approval.

Mr. Hammel stated as a starting point that the conditions of the 2019 Ordinance, staff is recommending that the approved items from 2019 be part of the new approval. Mr. Hammel stated the Ordinance before the Board includes the access and egress and includes a number of issues that were vetted in 2019.

Mr. Hammel stated another item is the parking condition for the proposed use. Mr. Hammel spoke of the requirement of 50 parking spaces for the whole development but they only have 30 spaces.

Mr. Hammel noted that in 2019 the petitioner conducted a traffic study by Gewalt Hamilton and Gewalt Hamilton had a few specific findings, one of which is that much of the congregation would walk during peak times due to their religious beliefs and secondly the sanctuary and the social hall would not be used simultaneously.

Mr. Hammel stated the proposed 30 spaces would meet the requirements of peak usage if there was only the sanctuary. Mr. Hammel stated it is for this reason that the ZBA agreed with the requirement that the sanctuary and the hall not be in use at the same time.

Mr. Hammel explained the building height regulations in relation to setbacks required for the building.

Mr. Hammel stated because the building is more to the south of the property that the building itself will be away from the residential neighbors.

Mr. Hammel summarized the ZBA meeting and how the petitioner's plans evolved and changed to adjust to the variations.

Mr. Hammel spoke of a letter from a neighbor, signed by other neighbors with their traffic and parking concerns with a request for parking limitations.

Mr. Hammel listed the following items that were before the ZBA on March 17, 2021.

Commissioner sought information regarding parking requirements and capacity of facility

- Based on resident concerns, one commissioner suggested a limit on capacity until impacts are better understood
- Petitioner reiterated that the congregation will arrive mostly by foot

Petitioner confirmed that he is agreeable to the conditions imposed in 2019 approval

Motion recommending approval was made with the following conditions:

- Village Landscape Architect review of landscape screening along the north lot line, with revisions to his satisfaction
- Worship space and basement meeting space cannot be used simultaneously
- 12-month "look back" to assess parking impacts, with reduced capacity being a potential means of mitigating parking impacts until other remedies can be implemented

Mr. Hammel went over the ZBA approvals that were before the Village Board.

Approval of an Ordinance granting Variations related to:

- Parking location
- Parking capacity
- Parking lot perimeter screening
- Building setbacks

Including conditions related to:

- Restrictions on the simultaneous use of the worship space and basement meeting space;
- Village Landscape Architect review of screening along the north lot line;
- Restricted vehicular access to/from the rear alley; and
- 12-month "look back" to assess traffic and parking impacts

President Bass asked if the 2019 conditions were met and if this basically was a formality due to the time lapse on the original Ordinance. Mr. Hammel stated it was a reiteration, yes.

Trustee Halevi stated we went through this before and doesn't have an issue and understands the issues. Trustee Halevi as if it is better to have a 12 month look back or residential only parking to avoid the look back?

Mr. Hammel stated that is an option to have the resident only parking go to the Traffic Commission.

Trustee Patel stated as far as the look-back relative to parking and access, Trustee Patel asked Mr. Libovits if he had an issue with residential only parking going before the Traffic Commission for a Public Hearing? Trustee Patel stated he understood the concerns of the residents on the block and felt if the processes was started now it might avoid some issues. Trustee Patel noted there was discussion regarding barricades but didn't see anything regarding that in the conditions. Trustee Patel asked the petitioner if he had any objections to adding to the Ordinance that the alley way cannot be closed at any time. Mr. Libovits stated he is agreeable to the residential only parking and not blockading the alley.

Mr. Hammel stated the item about the barricade was not included in the Ordinance but would have the Village attorney include it.

Trustee Sargon stated that she had a similar request which the petitioner already agreed to in regard to resident only parking. Trustee Sargon stated she would like for the Village to be proactive and not wait until there is an issue.

Trustee Klatzco stated his main concern is setting a precedent regarding parking Ordinance. Trustee Klatzco stated there are rooms upstairs that were not shown before. Trustee Klatzco stated he would have liked for Trustees Cope and Nickell to have been at the meeting as they voiced concerns as well about the parking and precedents being made. Trustee Klatzco stated he would like to table this item until a full Board was present. President Bass stated this was a formality and didn't feel the item needed to be tabled. President Bass stated the petitioner has addressed everything asked of them.

Trustee Klatzco made a motion to table till a full Board. There was no second for his motion.

President Bass stated there was a consensus to move forward. Steve Elrod, Village Attorney, stated there is an Ordinance in the packet that can be approved with the additional conditions as mentioned by Mr. Hammel.

Trustee Patel made a motion to approve the Ordinance with the stated conditions as well as the addition of beginning the process for resident only parking and the non-barricade of the alley.

Mr. Elrod stated they could add to the Ordinance the petitioner not objecting to go before the Traffic Commission and though it goes through the process it still may or may not pass regarding resident only parking but it would be nice to have in the Ordinance that the petitioner did not object to the process. Trustee Patel stated his motion was what Mr. Elrod sited plus the non-barricading of the alley. Second by Trustee Sargon.

President Bass stated he forgot during the President Report to congratulate Trustee Patel on winning the election and becoming Mayor. President Bass also thanked Jean Halevi, Grace Diaz Herrera.

President Bass noted that Trustee Nickell ran a nice campaign.

5. Consideration of the Following Items Pertaining to the Police and Fire Department Roof Replacement Project: A) a Resolution Authorizing the Execution of an Agreement with DCG Roofing Solutions Inc. of Melrose Park, Illinois for the Police and Fire Roof Replacement in the Amount of \$312,000; and B) an Ordinance Waiving the Competitive Bidding Process and Awarding a Contract to Christopher B. Burke Engineering Ltd. of Rosemont, Illinois for Construction Oversight in an amount not to exceed \$26,000

This item was presented by Nadim Badran, Public Works Director.

Mr. Badran gave background information how this item was discussed at the CIP and Budget Workshop and the Board had given direction to move forward with this item. Mr. Badran noted the Village Engineer estimated the job to be over \$400,000 but it came in at a cost of \$312,000.

Mr. Badran spoke of the engineering services as well and that the total project saving were \$195,000 from the estimate given.

Village Board had no comments

Trustee Sargon moved to approve the Ordinance, seconded by Trustee Patel.

6. Approval of a Resolution Authorizing the Execution of a Temporary Staffing Agreement with GovTempsUSA, LLC for Permit Clerk Services

This item was presented by Scott Mangum, Community Development Director.

Mr. Mangum provided the Board with a PowerPoint presentation explaining the current temporary staffing and the new, proposed temporary staff and the cost differential.

Mr. Mangum explained current staff on leave but their salary with insurance is almost equal to the cost of the temporary service. President Bass asked how long the temp employee would be needed. Mr. Mangum stated it was hard to state at this time.

Trustee Halevi asked about the time frame for the agreement. Mr. Mangum explained it is for a set time of eight weeks with the ability to extend the agreement if needed.

There were no other Trustee comments.

Trustee Klatzco moved to approve the Resolution, seconded by Trustee Patel.

Trustee Cope arrived around 8:37 p.m.

7. Consideration of an Extension of the Emergency Declaration Entered by Mayor Bass on March 18, 2020

This item was presented by the Village Attorney, Steve Elrod.

Mr. Elrod stated that the item is on the agenda for consideration and recommended that the emergency declaration entered by the Mayor on March 18, 2020 be extended to end of the next regular Board Meeting on April 20, 2021.

Trustee Klatzco made a motion to extend the Emergency Declaration to the adjournment of the next regular meeting of the Village Board April 20, 2021. Trustee Patel seconded the motion.

Upon Roll Call the results were:

Trustees Klatzco, Sargon, Patel, Cope, and Halevi

NAYS: None

The motion passed.

Manager's Report

Ms. Gaura gave an update on an article that appeared in the Chicago Tribune regarding lead levels in the water. The article referenced a sample taken from a home that had a result of 523 parts per billion and the water had been taken from a home that was vacant for over a month and the water was stagnant. After receiving the results staff asked the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) if the test should be retaken. IEPA stated it was not necessary to retake as the home was vacant.

Ms. Gaura stated that the article referenced that of the 27 samples taken they were between 5 and 40 parts per billion. Ms. Gaura stated the IEPA maximum limit for lead is under the 15 parts per billion and leaving the Village in compliance. Ms. Gaura stated that out of the majority of the tests that were referenced the majority were under the limit. Ms. Gaura state the Village pipes are cast iron. Ms. Gaura stated that when a home exceeds the threshold of lead it is usually the home owner's pipes that has the issue. Ms. Gaura stated that when the homeowner tests high the Village notifies the home owner. Ms. Gaura stated the Village is offering the residents the opportunity to use the village contractor this summer for a flat fee.

Ms. Gaura stated that prior to 2020 the IEPA required submittal of testing levels of lead and copper samples once every three years. Ms. Gaura stated that because Lincolnwood switched their water supplier from Chicago to the City of Evanston it triggered more lead and copper testing.

President Bass stated the article alarmed residents and asked that something be put out on social media what was stated at the meeting this evening. President Bass stated no basis for alarm based on the actual facts of the matter.

Ms. Gaura stated President Biden is proposing federal funding for replacement of lead service lines as it is a national issue.

Trustee Halevi thanked Mr. Badran for his explanation.

Trustee Sargon reiterated getting information out on social media.

There were no other comments.

Board and Commissions Report

Trustee Halevi stated over the past few weeks there has been participation in clean-up around the Village in the parks. Trustee Halevi stated the first one was organized by Trustee Patel and the second by resident Edy Kaminski. Trustee Halevi spoke of all the garbage that blows around and gets caught in the bushes and asked that all of us pitch in. Trustee Halevi reminded everyone that Earth Day is coming soon.

Trustees Reports

Trustee Sargon reminded the Board to fill out the Statement of Economic Interest.

Trustee Sargon spoke of the month of April the Village, in an initiative with the Environmental Ad-Hoc Committee are doing a #Green Lincolnwood initiative to encourage residents to pick-up garbage in their neighborhoods and take photos and post them using the hashtag in recognition of Earth Day on April 22.

Trustee Klatzco stated he received a call from our blood drive coordinator stating they are in desperate need of blood and that residents can reach out to Trustee Klatzco for more information.

Clerk's Report

At 8:57 P.M. Trustee Patel moved to adjourn the Village Board meeting, seconded by Trustee Halevi.

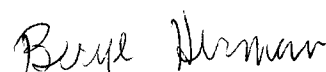
